- 4. Describe one event in the story that was very exciting or dramatic.
- 5. Explain why you did or did not like the ending to the story.
- 6. Explain how the title of the book is connected to the story.
- 7. Describe the setting of the story. Include the place, time, and what life was like then.
- 8. Write a different ending to the story you have just read.
- 9. Write a description of one of the characters in the book. Describe what the character looks like and also what type of person he or she is.
- 10. Write about a problem that one of the characters in the story had. Tell how that problem was or was not solved.
- 11. Write a poem about a character in the book.
- 12. Write ten comprehension questions and answers about the story.

- -Problems faced: what happened? Was the problem resolved? What actions did the characters do?
- -Setting: where the story is taking place, How does it look? Would you like to go there?
- -How would you act if you were in the character's shoes?
- -Predictions: What do you think will happen next?
- -Questions: Is there anything you do not understand?
- -Are you enjoying the novel? Why or why not?
- -Describe your favourite part of the chapter and your least favourite.

Novel MI Options

Music (Musical Rhythmic):

- 1. Write a rap, song or jingle that would describe one of the main characters.
- 2. Write a jingle to promote a book.
- 3. Your book has been selected to be turned into a musical. Write a song that would be part of that musical. (You may write an original or use the tune to a song you already know. You may use instruments if you choose.) Record or perform your song to present to the class.

Logic (Logical Mathematical):

 Choose one setting from the story and construct a model of a set or stage for that part of the story. Present your model to the class, explaining the parts of the set and what they represent.

Body (Bodily Kinesthetic):

 Act out one part of the story. (You may use puppets and/or other actors and puppeteers.)

Self (Intrapersonal):

- 1. Write 5 diary entries from a character's perspective based on a situation in the story. (Be sure to express appropriate thoughts and feelings.)
- 2. Write a letter to the author of your story. (Include questions, suggestions, and other comments about what you liked and what you didn't like.)

Picture (Visual Spatial):

 Create a graphic novel based on one section of the book. You may use original art work or computer-generated graphics. Present your project in hard copy or digitally.

People (Interpersonal):

 Readers' Theatre – (group project) Choose a section of the book to present as a Readers' Theatre. Add appropriate expression when presenting to the class.

Nature (Naturalist):

- Choose a character from the story and decide what animal he/she would be. Explain why.
- 2. Choose a section of your story that is set indoors and change it to an outdoor setting. Choose a habitat that would be suitable. Re-write this section, reflecting the alternate setting.

Word (Verbal Linguistic):

- 1. Choose 15 different words from your story and complete a three-point approach for each. (see below)
- 2. Write an alternate ending to the story.
- 3. Write about what you think will happen after the end of the story.
